Vale Margaret Kerlin



In last month's Pastor's Page, I wrote that Archbishop Philip Wilson who is the President of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference addressed Catholics in Australia and asked all to take part in the upcoming **Year of Grace** from Pentecost 2012 to Pentecost 2013.

He wrote in his letter:

'As Bishops, we asked ourselves where we can turn with so many issues affecting us. Our response in faith is to **start afresh from Christ**. We make this call, firstly and most urgently, to ourselves as Bishops. We are resolved, in the words of Pope John Paul II, to **contemplate the face of Christ**. Both these phrases come from his Apostolic Letter, *Novo Millennio Ineunte (At the Beginning of the New Millennium)*, and we use this Letter as our guide and inspiration.'

Bishop Wilson wrote:

'We are invited to grow in prayer; to help others to pray and to pray better. We call ourselves to repentance for the areas in which we have failed, individually and corporately, by commission and omission. And we will celebrate the gift of holiness, the gifts of the Spirit, with which the Father has blessed us through the Risen Lord.'

In response to the Bishop's encouragement, I suggested that one practical way we can respond to the Year of Grace is devote some additional time to the infinite resources available to us through our faith and especially through regular attendance at Mass and more specifically daily Masses.

The Church is solicitous not just to those who attend Mass regularly but also to those who find themselves in life situations incompatible with the full pastor's page

benefits and practice of the Catholic faith, including those persons who 'consider themselves separated from the Church'... All 'should be encouraged to listen to the Word of God, to attend the Sacrifice of the Mass, to persevere in prayer, to contribute to works of charity and to community efforts for justice, to bring up their children in the Christian faith, to cultivate the spirit and practice of penance and thus implore, day by day, God's grace' [CCC 1651].

The grace of God is a share in his own life, goodness and holiness. When we are like unto God, there is the increased potential to act more like God. Adam and Eve were born in grace. It was natural to them. Since Adam's first and catastrophic sin we can only obtain the sanctifying grace of justification through baptism [cf. CCC 2017]. Baptism is something that Jesus said was essential for all to 'see the kingdom of heaven' [John 3:5]. 'Grace is the help God gives us to respond to our unique vocation of becoming his adopted children. It introduces us into the intimacy of the Trinitarian life' [CCC 2021].

The Sanctifying grace which we first receive at baptism and grows and matures in us throughout life. This happens when we work with the many actual graces God gives us daily. Indeed, Jesus said 'I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing' [John

15:5]. 'Sanctifying grace makes us "pleasing to God" [CCC 2024].

Grace is the Holy Spirit's love gift to us. And St Paul states that this love gift 'has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us' [Romans 5:5]. Grace increases with every sacramental and prayerful encounter with God.

To emphasize grace is to highlight the type of life that Jesus, as Man, lived on earth. After Jesus healed the blind man the people affirmed, 'If this man were not from God. he could do nothing' [John 9:33]. It was understood even by the Jews that God's grace is necessary for good works. In emphasising this truth Jesus said to his followers, 'Very truly, I tell you, the Son can do nothing on his own, but only what he sees the Father doing; for whatever the Father does, the Son does likewise' [John 5:19]. "Courageous": Film turning the hearts of fathers and children to each other

Thousands of men are answering the call to rediscover God's plan for fatherhood, inspired by a new movie, "Courageous," due to be released on DVD on Tuesday.

The film, which debuted in theaters Sept. 30, follows four men striving to fulfill their mission "to serve and protect," both as law enforcement officers and fathers.

Stephen Kendrick, producer and co-writer of the film, told ZENIT that every day he sees some 200 e-mails from "people sharing how the movie has impacted, inspired and blessed them."

"The stories they share are so heartfelt and moving," he said. "Countless dads are now reaching out to win the hearts of their children."

Kendrick continued: "One man realized he needed to step up and reconnect with the daughter he'd abandoned.

"Many have chosen to forgive their dads.

"Wives are saying that 'my husband was a good dad, but now he's becoming a great dad after seeing this movie.'

"Couples heading for divorce have reunited and said that they must resolve to leave a legacy of faithfulness to their children like the men in the movie. We thank God for this!"

Waging war

As policemen, the main characters must team up against gang members and drug dealers to protect the community. Yet even as they battle evil with their guns and Tasers, they learn to use Scripture to fight the demons within in order to become the



men of integrity their families need.

"There is so much in Scripture about what fatherhood means, but most men have not taken time to search it out and then live it out," Kendrick stated. "'Courageous' shows it to them in living color."

He continued: "It is so incredible to see how a message about the importance of strong fatherhood is so deeply resonating with audiences.

"The issue of fatherhood touches the core of who we are. Millions of people have seen this movie and have gone on the emotional roller-coaster of laughter and tears as they watch five men trying to figure out what it means to be a great dad."

For actor Ken Bevel, who portrayed the cop Nathan Hayes, the movie was an opportunity to "help serve in turning the hearts of fathers to their children and the hearts of children to their fathers."

He explained to ZENIT: "As I look at the consistent decline of families and the minimal involvement of fathers in our communities, my heart is challenged -- challenged to the point of action. So, when God provided the opportunity to address biblical fatherhood through film, I was humbled that he would allow me to be used in such a task."

This role, Bevel said, "caused me to examine my own life and my role as a father."

He added: "I asked myself the question, 'Am I being completely intentional about fatherhood and leading my children to the Lord?' Unfortunately the answer was no. So, 'Courageous' has also challenged me to spend more time in Bible study with my family, while praying for wisdom in leading

my children to the Lord."

Kendrick expressed the hope for this "life change," not only for all who worked on the movie, but also for all who view it.

The film's release on DVD will allow its viewing by greater audiences. Parishes, ministries and other groups are encouraged to show the movie and utilize the corresponding resources to help effect this life-changing experience.

Tremendous opportunity

One group, the Philadelphia-based Fatherhood and Leadership Initiative, sponsored a showing of the movie that drew the players of two football teams with their fathers, in addition to other families.

Jim Gabriele, one of the group's founders, told ZENIT that "the response was tremendous." People were moved not only by the film, he said, but also by "the underlying message of love of Christ and faith in him as the foundation of a man's most important vocation -- his family."

"This movie clearly brings people together," added Gabriele, "and challenges men in particular to be men of the kingdom, the Godly husbands and fathers we are all called to be."

"Courageous" continued...

He added that the "widespread release of the movie provides a tremendous opportunity to put the emotion we all felt at the end of the movie to practical use in our daily lives."

"It is an unbelievably easy tool to use for ministry, and the producers have provided outstanding resources to bring the movie to life via Bible studies, small group sessions, etc." Gabriele noted.

He continued: "Men are notoriously hard to reach in ministry, but the ability to invite men to an engaging movie, followed by structured discussions and the ability to delve more deeply into their faith and how it applies to marriage and fatherhood is an incredible gift."

He revealed to ZENIT that his group will be sponsoring an eightweek study series, available through the Internet as well, on scriptural fatherhood.

Kendrick expressed the hope that many of this generation of men will see "Courageous" and "learn that the role of father is irreplaceable."

He underlined the hope that the audience will see that God created

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fatherhood "to introduce the next generation to what their loving Heavenly Father is like: a loving Provider, a strong Protector, an honorable Authority, a great Example, a wise Teacher, and an intimate Friend."

The producer continued: "We hope that men get a vision for this and begin to step up with courage and begin to lead their families by example as God intended. This will positively affect the next generation in countless ways."

> "We produced a movie," he concluded. "But only he can change a heart. To him alone be the glory!"

The House at Ephesus by Paula J. Sandlak

I am happy to tell my story, I hope it brings people to the faith and opens up their hearts to listen to God's call for them.

My parents are military, so I traveled. They were Methodist but became sort of nondescript Protestants. I was about 20 or 21 when my dad was stationed in Turkey. Turkey is a very interesting place. It is the home of the Trojan Horse, has lots of ruins, and a very special place called Ephesus.

Some may have heard about it, some may not. It is reported to be the last home of the Blessed Mother. The place where the disciple John took her after the death and Resurrection of Jesus.

We were on vacation when we visited Ephesus, just seeing the sights. I had been thinking about conversion for a long time, but hadn't really gotten anywhere. When we visited this house, I, like hundreds of other tourists, went into the home. It is a plain stone structure with dirt floors. There was a small altar and kneeler there, so I knelt down to pray.

Suddenly, I heard an interior voice say, "Now is the time." I thought someone was telling me it was time to go, but I looked around and no one was there. It was very subtle, kind of like being encased in a sound-proof bubble. I was staring at the statue of Our Lady and the same silence came and the same voice, "Now is the time"

I went out, we left and finished our vacation. We went home. But all the while, it nagged at me. After several weeks, I finally said to my mother, "What would you think?" She completed the thought, "If you became Catholic?"

It was downright eerie. I asked her how she knew what I was going to say, and she told me that from the moment I came out of the house at Ephesus I seemed at total peace. She had already set up an appointment with me with the Priest on the base. He was great and very helpful and welcoming. He said to me "I think that Our Lady was as direct with you as she could be without hitting you on the head with the

Bible."

My instruction started that very afternoon. I know the good Father was exhausted because I had so many questions. Very patient. He gave me my first rosary and said, "This is the most powerful weapon of the Church." I said, "what do I do with it?" Realizing I had no idea what it was for, he patiently taught

me. Everyone should have a priest

I went back to school in Colorado. I found a parish there and took up instruction. Since at that time there was no RCIA, I was on my own. I took instruction for about 4 months and then. I was conditionally baptized, (I was already baptized Methodist), received confession, and first communion all in the same day. It was glorious!

Unborn Baby's Kick Prompts Mum to Save Father's Life

LifeNews.com _ 1/16/12 3:59 PM File this one under amazing tales: We've all heard stories of how children — or event pets — have been able to alert 911, emergency officials or simply another person to an alarming situation that involves a life or death situation.

In this case, in a story out of Atlanta, Georgia, a baby saved his father's life before he was even born.

According to Sara McDonald, who is 7 1/2 months pregnant, her husband, Thomas, wouldn't be here today if her baby hadn't given her a very powerful sign that something was wrong - a big kick. She says that kick from her baby, Cameron, jolted her out of a deep sleep where she found her husband unresponsive.

She told a TV station he didn't have a heartbeat and that he was "purple from the waist up." She was, understandably, terrified and called police after trying to perform CPR herself. Officers say they weren't sure he would make it, but fortunately he did, and he's going to be fine.

McDonald has no doubt that her unborn son was responsible: "It's like my baby saved my husband's life. It's



Modern Medical Miracles

Aug 12, 2011

Doctors at Zurich University Children's Hospital have performed surgery on unborn babies still inside their mothers' wombs.

The operations - the first of their kind outside the US - were conducted on unborn children with spina bifida.

The condition can lead to

paralysis of the lower limbs and sometimes to mental disability. The two successful prenatal surgeries were conducted late 2010 and halfway through this year, Martin Meuli, director of surgery said.

A hospital statement described the procedure as a major step for prenatal surgery in Europe. It is very challenging for the surgeons:

two distinct patients, the mother

and the unborn baby, have to be anaesthetized, monitored and operated on at the same time.
