Mary Help of Christians Australia's Patroness

Each year Australia celebrates Mother's Day in May. This is very appropriate because each of us is born from a mother. This is no small matter given that many women have died in the process of child birth. Motherhood is a very loving, sanctifying and sacrificial action. This is true not just for the period of gestation and birth of the baby but also for the many years of care that follow a child's birth.

Every person should remain grateful to his or her mother. God reminds us in the fourth commandment that we are to be honourable to our mother. Even the book of Proverbs wisely states: 'Hear, my child, your father's instruction, and do not reject your mother's teaching'; [1:8] and 'Let your father and mother be glad; let her who bore you rejoice' [23:25]. We should all try to make Mother's Day a very special occasion for Mums. But this should not just be for one day but every day! Next Sunday May 13 will be Mother's Day. Traditionally, May 13 is also a Feast Day of Mary the Mother Jesus who is God. This is also a special day for our church at San Isidore as it is the day of its Patronal Feast, Our Lady of the Eucharist.

Just as we honour our earthily mothers who honour us with love and care, so too it is very appropriate for us to honour our heavenly Mother; Mary the

Mother of Jesus and the Helper of all Christians. We are privileged to have the Mother of God as a patroness and spiritual protector (Latin Etymology: patronus, protector.). This is no insignificant title. A patron or patrona is a person who supports, maintains or protects another person, project, or enterprise. In Church history patrons were benefactors whose donations and benevolence was greatly esteemed because of the donation of land, the building of a church, or the maintaining of its running expenses. In church law the right of patronage is of a spiritual order and is subject to ecclesiastical jurisdiction. In the early days of Australia given the difficulties and hardships of early settlers and the Church, the first Bishops agreed to seek a heavenly patron. The story of Australia's main Patrona is interesting.

Historically, Australia's mother church in Sydney was named "St. Mary's". Today it is known as St Mary's Cathedral. The foundation stone, actually reminds us that the original title was "Mary, The Immaculate Help of Christians". This is a very wonderful title. It incorporates the Blessed Virgin Mary as both the Immaculate Conception and the Helper of Christians. Just how this title came to be chosen is a puzzle to be pieced together from fragmentary records and conjectures.

It seems likely that it was the choice of lay Catholics themselves, as they leant heavily, as the first church did, on Mary's help for the establishment of the early Australian church. In the founding of Sydney town there was no Catholic priest for some years. It was precisely during this priest-less period (1802-1819) that Pope Pius VII was returned to Rome in 1814 after being exiled by Napoleon Bonaparte. It was on May 24th 1815 that Pope Pius instituted the Feast of Our Lady Help of Christians in gratitude to his heavenly Mother.

This dramatic episode had deeply impressed and struck a sympathetic chord in the heart of Irish Catholics is proved by the Pope's subsequent letter of gratitude to the Irish Bishops and faithful, thanking them for their loyalty to him in exile, and for their joy on his return to Rome.

Father Therry had been ordained priest the very year of Pius VII's return to Rome. In 1841 Father Therry wrote to Archbishop Polding requesting that Australia be dedicated to Mary's name. This suggestion was taken up by the first Provincial Synod of Bishops held at Sydney in 1844. It appointed Mary, Help of Christians, subject to the approval of the Holy See, as principal Patroness of Australasia.

The first Catholic settlers here, convict or free, had an instinctive reverence for the Mother of the Church. The vigour and independence of the Australian Catholics found an ideal meeting place in this strong Marian title. For in the early years, through force of circumstances, it was to be a layman's Church. So in their isolated and under-privileged conditions, the Catholic pioneers found this patronal title ideal from both a psychological and historical viewpoint.

It was to the early Australian settler's credit that, despite their fewness and poverty, they were the first nation in the world to erect a national basilica with that title (1821); the first to choose Mary, Help of Christians as principal patroness (1842); and the first to celebrate the feast on a nationwide scale (1852).

One of the most recent significant events of the history of devotion to Mary Help of Christians was the pilgrimage of the Australia bishops to St Mary's Cathedral in Sydney during the Marian Year of 1988.

At that time Australia was rededicated to Mary, Help of Christians, before a large crowd in the Basilica specially dedicated to Mary Help of Christians. On that Sunday April 14, Cardinal Clancy led the Bishops of Australia to rededicate Australia to the care and protection of Mary Help of Christians This is the faith of our Fathers, let us embrace it and dedicate ourselves to

embrace it and dedicate ourselves to our heavenly Mother, our Help.

Pray the Rosary every day, especially within the family and make our heavenly Mother proud. Immaculate Mary, Help of Christians, pray for us.



This is a pretty neat story and an interesting thing that few of us know. It's brief, so please read. (FROM A DOCTOR)



St Joseph and the Staircase

Santa Fe's old town square district is charming and lively. Only a few blocks away from the cathedral stands one of the oldest churches in the US — the San Miguel chapel. ... constructed in 1610. ... Only a few steps away lies the chapel of Loretto, which, by contrast, looks transplanted directly from Europe, built in the 1870s. In fact, ... its real claim to fame — as I was to discover only upon visiting — is its remarkable wooden, spiral staircase.

Here's how it came to be. The recently arrived sisters of Loretto were pleased with the progress of the chapel — quite a sophisticated undertaking in such a remote corner of the new world — whose construction they had placed under the patronage of St. Joseph. Only as construction was winding down did everyone realize that they had not devised a means for the nuns on the ground floor to access the choir loft above. They needed stairs of some sort, but given the height of the loft, a typical staircase would necessarily invade too much space below and seriously detract from its intimacy and integrity. The sisters consulted with local carpenters, but none could provide a feasible proposal. They were in a bind. So they decided to pray a novena to St. Joseph. And on the ninth day, a man showed up on a donkey and offered to do the job. He had with him only a saw, a Tsquare, and a hammer. He worked alone. Accounts differ as to how long he took to complete the task, but it was likely at least several

The man solved the dilemma by creating a spiral staircase that made two complete 360 degree rotations. Typically such circular staircases require a vertical pole for support down the center, but he did it without one. He used no nails or screws — only wooden pegs as fasteners. At every step, the wood is perfectly curved. He'd soaked his wood in tubs of water the sisters had

provided — but how exactly did he get all the curves just right? Well, the net result, by all accounts, was a true masterpiece of craftsmanship and beauty staggeringly produced with the most rudimentary instruments by a single, supremely skilled man. When it was all finished, the ecstatic nuns went to pay the man. But they could not find him. He had simply left. They checked with the local lumber suppliers, thinking that at least they could pay for the wood. But they didn't know what the sisters were talking about.

Speaking of the wood, the Mother

Superior in 1960 reported: "Many experts have tried to identify the wood and where it came from. No one has ever been able to give a full report on it." The one thing they knew by then was that this particular wood did not come from New Mexico.

Since then, a forester and wood specialist was given a sample of the wood, and spent over a year scientifically analyzing it. He produced a technical report, which I picked up in the gift shop. He was first able to determine that it was a cone-bearing evergreen, and later, a spruce. But what kind of spruce — which subspecies? Further molecular investigation revealed that it came from an extremely cold climate. This only confirmed it was definitely not local.

Ultimately, he could find no specific match in the scientific record for this particular type of wood. It has no known origin.

There are skeptics of this entire narrative, of course. But they have not provided an irrefutable explanation for this "miraculous staircase" — as it is commonly called. The subject of television movies and specials even an "unsolved mystery" segment (none of which I've seen). It remains a source of fascination and wonder. It's hard not to notice that the carpenter left without saying a word, just as St. Joseph is silent throughout the Scriptures. Many feel that St. Joseph himself actually built it. The sisters and the entire local Church, however, were always properly reluctant to comment definitively saying only that they knew it was somehow an answer to their prayers. In her autobiography, St. Teresa of Avila could not have been more effusive in testifying to St. Joseph's capacity for intercession; she obtained through him not only healing of temporary paralysis but also countless other and what she regarded as greater benefits for her soul. She regularly took to making requests of him on his feast day, which were granted without fail or at least, as she puts it, redirected for her greater good.

Having received blessings that far exceeded what she had asked of him, she wanted to convince everyone to be devoted to St. Joseph, imploring: "I only beg, for the love of God, that anyone who does not believe me will put what I say to the test."

That inviting challenge remains before

Australian Seminaries on a Roll as Numbers Rise

Over the past 3 years, Cardinal Pell has ordained 14 men for the Archdiocese of Sydney. Also, in 2011, 8 more were ordained as Deacons, 4 from the Archdiocese's own seminary and another 4 from the Neocatechumenate Seminary.

In the normal course of events, these 8 Deacons will be ordained priests this year which means that the Sydney archdiocese has gained a significant boost in younger priests these last 4 years. In fact, around Australia seminary numbers are rising.

In August 2012, Corpus Christi seminary, Melbourne, will host the 14th National Inter-Seminary Soccer Tournament. Over 200 seminarians from the Australian east coast will attend this annual event which affirms their vocations and gives them a sense of the significant numbers of men preparing for the priestly ministry.

There are 3 seminaries in Sydney: the Archdiocesan Seminary, the Neocatechumenate seminary & Parramatta diocese's Holy Spirit Seminary— overall, some 60 men. At Holy Spirit Seminary there are 11, 5 of whom have just entered this year.

Melbourne has 53 seminarians in residence. 15 are new for 2012 and 9 are in First Year. There are also 3



studying in Rome & 5 deacons in awaiting ordination later this year. Meanwhile, there are another 20 seminarians at Vianney College, 5 of whom commenced recently.

Brisbane has 32 seminarians and in Perth, there are 22 at St Charles Seminary and 5 studying overseas. At the Neocatechumentate Seminary in Perth, there are 17 seminarians including 4 men who commenced training recently.

The seminary enthusiasm is reflected in the increased numbers of young men seeking admission to Religious Orders and Congregations such as the Missionaries of God's Love, the Franciscan (Capuchins), the Priestly Fraternity of St Peter and the Dominicans.

The Missionaries of God's Love, founded in Canberra by Father Ken Barker, have 30 seminarians at Burwood in Melbourne.

Father Tony Percy, Rector of the Good Shepherd seminary says that these increasing numbers will gradually address the challenge of the priest shortage in Australia . There is definitely a renewed interest in the Church and in the priesthood,' he says. 'World Youth Days in Sydney 2008 and Madrid 2011 have helped.'


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

2 cups flour

1 heaping cup of sugar

1 tablespoon cream

1/2 cup butter
