ANZAC day - solemn, moving, and, as always, well attended.

In fact, if anyone had predicted it was a custom from a by-gone age destined to fade into history, they would be very surprised. There were huge crowds getting up before dawn to remember those who gave their lives, and a full Cathedral of the Faithful praying for them as four soldiers stood guard around the holy Altar, and then a grand procession up the main street to the war memorial. It may well be said of the ceremonies and processions that "age shall not weary them". The old fashion is not old, nor are the young destined to loose the treasures handed down to them.

Now, let us turn our thoughts to another tradition, the celebration of Corpus Christi!

As we remember soldiers who gave their lives for us in earthly battles, we even more remember Jesus, Our Blessed Lord, who died to save us from sin, to free us from the slavery it brings, to win a peace and happiness which will last forever in heaven. As the soldiers gave their lives for us, we even more remember Jesus who said, "This is My Body, which will be given up for you...this is the chalice of My Blood poured out for you."

On the **Feast of Corpus Christi** we recall that there is no greater love than for a man to give his life for his friends, and this is what Jesus has done for us. Even more, He is present in every Tabernacle around the world, for us!

This is not, this must not be, a custom of a by gone age. Surely we could not be so ungrateful. And thanks be to God, slowly, we are seeing a resurgence of Eucharistic understanding and adoration. Before World Youth Day in 2008, a youth worker was told by a secondary school principal that 'Adoration' and 'Confession' were "turn-off words for youth". That principal had it all wrong, as the crowds of youth going to Confession at World Youth Day proved. And when Pope Benedict held up the Monstrance containing Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament, 400,000 youth were so quiet that we could hear birds in the distance. What a

moment of united adoration!

Processions in many centres are growing bigger. Those fashionconscious nay-sayers who claimed that processions are not part of our culture (ignoring the custom of sporting parades) have shown themselves poor judges of fashion. When Eucharistic and Marian processions are organized, they are enjoyed by many people.

As with ANZAC day, **Corpus Christi Day** is a time to grasp more firmly the greatest treasure Jesus has given us - the Mass and the Real Presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament.

On ANZAC Day, hearing the beautiful 'Ode' helps us ponder the meaning of the occasion. Likewise, hearing prayers which Saints have composed in thanksgiving for Holy Communion helps us appreciate this amazing reality. From time to time we will make these available at Mass to help in our thanksgiving, but for now, let me share one such prayer, from St Pio of Pietrelcina (Padre Pio).

Why Engineers Don't Write Recipe Books

Chocolate Chip Cookies: Ingredients: 1. 532.35 cm3 gluten 2. 4.9 cm3 NaHCO3 3. 4.9 cm3 refined halite 4. 236.6 cm3 partially hydrogenated tallow triglyceride 5. 177.45 cm3 crystalline C12H22O11 6. 177.45 cm3 unrefined C12H22O11 7. 4.9 cm3 methyl ether of protocatechuic aldehyde 8. Two calcium carbonateencapsulated avian albumen-coated protein

9. 473.2 cm3 theobroma cacao 10. 236.6 cm3 de-encapsulated legume meats (sieve size #10) To a 2-L jacketed round reactor vessel (reactor #1) with an overall heat transfer coefficient of about 100 Btu/F-ft2-hr, add ingredients one, two and three with constant agitation. In a second 2-L reactor vessel with a radial flow impeller operating at 100 rpm, add ingredients four, five, six, and seven until the mixture is homogenous. To reactor #2, add ingredient eight, followed by three equal volumes of the homogenous mixture in reactor #1. Additionally, add ingredient nine and ten slowly, with constant agitation. Care must be taken at this point in the reaction to control any temperature rise that may be the result of an exothermic reaction.

Using a screw extrude attached to a #4 nodulizer, place the mixture piece-meal on a 316SS sheet (300 x 600 mm). Heat in a 460K oven for a period of time that is in agreement with Frank & Johnston's first order rate expression (see JACOS, 21, 55), or until golden brown. Once the reaction is complete, place the sheet on a 25C heat-transfer table, allowing the product to come to equilibrium.

The Corporal Works of Mommy & Daddy

Feeding the Hungry: Family members truly bless one another when they create a nurturing place around the dinner table for communion and conversation to occur and when they take time to plan nourishing, heartwarming meals. Tons of research reveals the benefits of families sitting down to meals together including everything from better physical and mental health outcomes, higher academic achievement, and greater life and relationship satisfaction. Add "growing in holiness" to the list!

Give Drink to the Thirsty: What parent hasn't been asked to get a thirsty child a drink in the middle of the night? Getting up and serving that child cheerfully with compassion is a work of mercy that reminds the child that his or her needs are important and that they will be heard and loved even when it is inconvenient for us to do so.

Clothe the Naked: Finding the grace to be patient while dealing with a toddler who only wants to wear the blue shirt or helping a teen dress attractively, yet modestly, isn't just an exercise in patience, it's an opportunity to help your children remember their worth in God's eyes!

Arizona Woman Claims Full Healing After Venerating Relics of St. Charbel



Physicians cannot explain why her eyesight was fully restored after prayers to St. Charbel Makhlouf of Lebanon

When Dafne Gutierrez, a 30-yearold blind mother of three, stood in front of a priest for a blessing, she felt there was someone standing on her right. Her family told her later that the priest was standing on her left side.

"There was somebody [on the right] touching me," she told her sister-in-law, who responded, "But there was nobody close to you."

"And ever since then I was feeling my body differently," Gutierrez said in an interview Monday.

She was at St. Joseph Maronite Catholic Church in Phoenix on a Saturday in mid-January for the visit of the relics of the St. Charbel Makhlouf, which were being brought around to many of the 36 Maronite parishes in the United States. Over the next couple of days her husband noticed something unusual about her. He asked her what the matter was. "You seem different," he said.

Before dawn on Monday morning, she complained to him that it felt like her eyes were burning. Her husband noticed a smell in the room that resembled meat burning.

She tried opening her eyes. "I couldn't see clearly, but I could see like shadows. I told him, 'I can see you,'" she recalled.

Gutierrez had lived with Arnold Chiari malformation since she was 13. Two years ago she lost vision in her left eye, and then in her right eye last year. Doctors inserted a shunt to try to relieve the pressure, but that failed. Her headaches were "viselike," and she was afflicted with tinnitus, vomiting, dizziness and seizures. She was approved to go to a rehab/nursing facility because she couldn't care for her children.

Her sister-in-law heard that the relics were coming and that St. Charbel had healed a blind boy in Mexico. Gutierrez is neither Maronite nor Lebanese, but as a woman of faith she prayed for the saint's intercession. He's had a great track record of healing, even after his

death in 1898.

Not only was her vision restored, it was restored to 20/20, said Dr. Anne Borik, one of several physicians to examine Gutierrez. "The pressure in her brain got to the point where it caused damage to the optic nerve. After this happened, the optic nerve looked completely normal, with no signs of damage or atrophy," she said in an interview "There's nothing in the medical literature that anything like this had ever happened."

She said that a long-standing damaged optic nerve causing blindness "does not just all of a sudden look normal in two days with complete restoration of vision." According to the medical committee of which she was a member, she said, "We have no medical explanation and therefore believe this to be a miraculous healing through the intercession of St. Charbel."

"God gave me my vision back for a reason," Gutierrez said. "I want to be able to help others. I give testimony wherever I can because it's important for people to know that God does exist and he does hear us. I tell people, 'Don't lose the faith. And the most important of all is confession, which brings you healing.""

Polish Eucharistic Miracle Approved Amid Nation's 1,050th Anniversary of Christianity

LEGNICA, Poland — A bleeding Host that "has the hallmarks of a Eucharistic miracle" was approved for veneration in Poland over the weekend.

The announcement was made by Bishop Zbigniew Kiernikowski of Legnica on April 17.

On Christmas Day 2013, a consecrated Host fell to the floor, the bishop said. It was picked up and placed in a container with water. Soon after, red stains appeared on the Host.

Then-Bishop of Legnica Stefan Cichy created a commission to monitor the Host. In February 2014, a small fragment was placed on a corporal and underwent testing by various research institutes. The final medical statement by the Department of Forensic Medicine found: "In the histopathological image, the fragments were found containing the fragmented parts of the cross-striated muscle. It is most similar to the heart muscle." Tests also determined the tissue to be of human origin and found that it bore signs of distress.

Saying that the Host "has the hallmarks of a Eucharistic miracle," Bishop Kiernikowski explained that in January 2016 he presented the matter to the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith.

In April, in accordance with the Holy See's recommendations, he asked parish priest Andrzej Ziombrze "to prepare a suitable place for the relics so that the faithful could venerate it."

The announcement coincides with the 1,050th anniversary of Christianity in Poland. The power of Poland's "invincible national spirit" and resilience to countless foreign invaders lies not with her government or military, but in the nation's Christian identity, its president said on Friday.
