

How to raise a moral child - by Tamara Rajakariar



As a parent, would you rather raise a successful child or a moral child? In a recent article in the NY Times, parents surveyed the world over put greater importance on their child caring rather than achieving. That's all well and good – but what next? How can parents do their best to ensure that their child turns out "good" rather than "bad"? There's no simple answer, with everything from nature to nurture having an influence. But the article did have three main pointers that definitely make sense:

Reinforcing the good

Praise good behaviour, but in a way that commends good character, rather than good actions. Phrases like "you're a nice and helpful person" are more effective than "that was a nice and helpful thing to do". This is because praising character helps kids to internalise it as part of who they are – and if actions reflect character, one is more likely to act well. And if one's actions are consistently repeated, they will become moral habits.

Responding to bad behaviour The goal here is getting the kids to feel guilt rather than shame. Guilt is the feeling of having done a bad thing, whereas shame is about feeling like a bad person – which can make them feel small and like the damage is irreparable. Research shows that an angry reaction will bring about shame, while a disappointed reaction brings about guilt. A disappointed reaction should express this sentiment as well as what was wrong about the behaviour, how it affected others, and how to rectify.

Actions speak louder than words It's always been said, but now the research backs it up. Kids will mimic the adult behaviour that they see, whether or not the adult's words matched what they said. Looks like the most effective way to bring up a moral child is to live in the way that you'd want them to live!



The Benefits of Gratitude by Ashley Crouch



Sitting around the crowded dinner table at Thanksgiving, my family has a tradition of sharing things from the last year for which we are thankful. My mind recalled a cold afternoon, up to my knees in dust and tiles, shovelling through the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy. "Thank you for helping to clean up my town!" one woman said to me, emotion filling her voice. Despite the chill temperatures, her heart was warm. I was so moved by the glimmer of hope that people clung to as they surveyed their shattered lives. It was easy for me to be grateful.

Turns out, gratitude plays an important role, not only in rebuilding broken walls, but also in expanding our hearts and improving life satisfaction. A report from the Harvard Medical Association found that gratitude helps us refocus on what we have instead of what we lack. Those who count their blessings have less likelihood for depression, anxiety, or envy, while possessing stronger social connections, greater relationship satisfaction, and a real leg up in the workplace.

While fostering positive thought patterns conjures up images of Bob Wiley in What About Bob–"I feel fine, I feel fine, I feel really fine"– the decision to choose gratitude goes much deeper and is a reflection of character. Gratitude is derived from the Latin word, gratia, meaning grace or graciousness. A gracious heart is one that gives life to others and is rooted in a gracious mind.

By training ourselves to identify points of gratitude, we focus less on the past or future, and more on embracing the present moment. Rather than bonding over shared gripes and annoyances, recognizing the positive helps us turn towards one another in our relationships and fosters stronger connections. While it may seem fake at first, exercising the gratitude muscle can pay lasting dividends.

For instance, although graciousness is lacking in many workplace settings, recent studies by Bersin and Associates found that employers who offer their employees recognition and gratitude are 12 times more likely to generate strong business results than their peers. Jay Love at Inc. Magazine suggests that supervisors try to catch a team member doing something right and then point them out in front of everyone to boost team performance. It seems that sincere positive affirmation can turn a cold cubicle into a place brimming with productivity and innovation.

The benefits of expressing gratitude are not limited to the workplace. In fact, what if there is a "secret formula" for transforming your love life from stagnant to sensational? World-renowned psychologist Dr. John Gottman studied thousands of couples and found that those who practiced a 5:1 ratio of positive compliments and behaviors to negative ones reported the highest satisfaction. Couples who regularly take time to consider those qualities that they appreciate about their significant other put stock in what Gottman calls the "emotional savings account," that helps them be more resilient during times of stress.

Conflict will happen in any relationship, but major research on emotional psychology discovered that it can be easier to offer criticism when both parties rest secure in their affection and goodwill towards one another. By contrast, Gottman found that couples headed towards divorce or in a strained relationship exhibit a ratio of just under 1:1.

So get out that pen and paper and start making a list of all those qualities you just love about your significant other! Sprinkle compliments throughout your conversations, in small notes, or in a special text in the morning. And remember, women need love, men need respect.

Overall, fostering an attitude of gratitude helps expand our hearts to love. Whether facing major tragedies or coasting through life successfully, we could all use a little more graciousness. Let's take Thanksgiving with us, long after the leftover turkey has been put away.

Archbishop Julian Porteous on "Don't Mess with Marriage" Booklets



The ABC recently reported that Tasmanian Martine Delaney is taking the Catholic Archbishop of

Hobart to the Anti-Discrimination Commission over a booklet about same sex marriage. The booklet, 'Don't Mess With Marriage', was sent to Catholics around Australia earlier this year. In Tasmania it went out to churches and the parents of children at Catholic Schools.

Archbishop Porteous has made the following Statement in response to complaint lodged with Anti-Discrimination Commissioner

Statement in response to complaint lodged with Anti-Discrimination Commissioner

"The Catholic Church has a positive vision of human sexuality, marriage and family life, which we believe provides the way to authentic human happiness. It is the role of Catholic schools to promote this positive vision. Indeed parents choose to send their children to Catholic schools because of Catholic teaching.

Recently the Catholic Bishops of

Australia produced a pastoral letter to the Catholic faithful to better explain this teaching in light of efforts to change the current legal definition of marriage. In order to assist the Catholic community in Tasmania to better understand why the Church has sought to defend the current legal definition of marriage, I asked Catholic Schools in Tasmania to distribute this booklet to parents with children in our schools.

I asked that the booklet be delivered in a sealed envelope to parents and guardians, as I believe it is parents who are the best educators of their children in cases such as this.

It is important to make clear that the Bishop's Pastoral letter on Marriage affirms the dignity of all human beings regardless of their physical characteristics, gender or the orientation of their sexual attraction. And condemns in the strongest terms any form of unjust discrimination.

I am aware that there are some in society who would seek to silence the Church on this issue, and indeed prevent Christians expressing their beliefs in the public square on important social issues. Increasingly they are trying to manipulate antidiscrimination legislation to achieve



this end.

This represents the rise of a new intolerance against Christianity in Australian society, and more generally a threat to freedom of speech. It is important in a democratic society like Australia that every person is free to present what they believe to be true. There should not be threats or intimidation against anyone who expresses a view in favour of traditional marriage.

It is important that Australia has the opportunity for an open and free debate about the nature of marriage leading up to a plebiscite. It should be conducted in an atmosphere of respect and where all arguments can be presented and exposed to rigorous scrutiny."

THE WEST WAGGA WAG

In 2011, I joined a few thousand or so other people and signed up for a newish service that, I thought, might be handy.

The idea behind it was to get email reminders for novenas as you prayed them in a virtual community. It was pretty straightforward.

In the four years since, Pray More Novenas, run by husband-and-wife team John-Paul and Annie Deddens, has turned into one of the best prayer efforts I make. It also serves almost 200,000 people around the world.

Asked how this effort started, John-Paul Deddens shares:

"My wife and I had recently started dating and she asked me to pray the Immaculate Conception novena with her. Several of her friends at the Newman Center were planning to pray it together. I thought about it for a minute and turned her down. I could tell that she was disappointed, but I had always been disappointed by novenas in the past. Actually, I wasn't disappointed in the novenas themselves, but rather in my own discipline to complete an entire

novena. Not exactly the best reason not to pray with my future wife! After that novena was already underway I realized that there were probably other people who struggled to finish novenas as well. That's when I got the idea to send reminder emails out with the prayers for each day in them. I launched the website a few weeks later."

Pray More Novenas started not long after, in 2010, with the Christmas Novena. The intention was for an end to abortion, and more than 500 people were on board. "With that much interest starting out," Deddens recounts, "I knew that I had found a need."

He set the goal of one novena a month and what started as a side project for him has turned into fulltime work for both him and Annie.

"The greatest blessing for me," he shares "has been being able to see how God answers prayers in a powerful way. Annie and I get to see big answered prayers every day."

After each novena, they invite participants to share answered prayers. John-Paul and Annie then share those answers with the larger Pray More Novenas community. "We've found it to be so uplifting, and it gives us a moment to reflect on the power of prayer when we all come together for each novena. It also gives us a moment to truly be in awe of what God is doing with these prayers."

Deddens also cites another blessing that's come from his and Annie's work with Pray More Novenas: "how we, even just the two of us, have been able to grow in our faith because of these novenas and the community that has grown over the years. Even when our prayers aren't answered, we're learning more about how to cling to our faith in those times, just as many other members of Pray More Novenas do with their unanswered prayers. And the more that we pray, the more that those prayers have changed us; we used to come to prayer asking God for what we want, but we're learning more how to pray and ask for God's will. That has been very transformative for us."

The Deddenses also manage a few other websites, including Pope Quotes and Catholic Wife, Catholic Life. You can join the Pray More Novenas community by going to PrayMoreNovenas.com and entering your email. It seems like such a small thing...and it is. But the rewards, if you open the emails and pray along, are eternal.
