PASTOR'S PAGE - CONCERNED CATHOLICS AND THE COMMUNION OF SAINTS



Recently, news was shared of an American lady who suffered terrible imprisonment and torture at the hands of ISIS before she died as a martyr, holding firm to her faith in Jesus Christ. Not only did she keep the faith, but also was given the gift of peace that could only have come from God. She even shared that peace in a letter smuggled to her family by another prisoner.

Kayla Mueller wrote,

"I remember mom always telling me that all in all in the end the only one you really have is God. I have come to a place in experience where, in every sense of the word, I have surrendered myself to our creator because literally there was no else.+ by God + by your prayers I have felt tenderly cradled in freefall...I have been shown in darkness, light + have learned that even in prison, one can be free. I am grateful.

"I have come to see that there is good in every situation, sometimes we just have to look for it... I pray each day that if nothing else, you have felt a certain closeness + surrender to God as well + have formed a bond of love + support amongst one another.

"Please be patient, give your pain to God. I know you would want me to remain strong. That is exactly what I am doing... Do not fear for me, continue to pray as will I + by God's will we will be together soon." This is the language of Faith, Hope and Love, the language of the saints. It points to the grace which unites us to God and to each other.

In November we celebrate the Saints in heaven, including all those who have not been canonized; and we remember with love and prayers the Holy Souls, the people who have died loving God imperfectly and are being purified, getting ready for the perfect happiness of our everlasting home. We need also to remember that together with these two groups we form the Kingdom of God, the family of grace. We are united to them and to each other by Faith and Baptism, joined in the love of God.

Sometimes this unity of grace is disturbed by the failings of different members of the Church. Even the Apostles had arguments, and Jesus told them in response, "unless you become like little children, you cannot enter the Kingdom of God." I would imagine that any disputes and divisions between members of the Church would become very small in the face of an attack like that of ISIS. The external dangers of atheism, anarchy, anti-life and antifamily movements etc. should help us stick together.

A group calling itself "Concerned Catholics" recently came into Wagga. The problem is that this group has among its aims to change some of the structure, sacraments and teachings of the Church which was founded by Jesus, rather than simply helping us live the life of the Church as Jesus gave it.

Of course it is right for us to be concerned for building up the Kingdom of God, and facing with courage problems in the Church. Following the parable of Jesus, we should seek to remove the plank from our own eye before removing the splinter from the eye of another. We should also follow the Gospel pattern of confronting a person at fault face to face; then with another friend; then with the whole community. The Pope and Bishops have a special responsibility to tackle sins of abuse and heresy by leaders; and also to help everyone carry out the two great missions given by Jesus: for us to be holy; and to share Christ's light with the world.

We love the Church; we are so grateful to God for giving us the blessings which come from the Catholic Church: here we can know for certain what God has taught us about Himself, about redemption, and about what is morally right and wrong; here we have the Presence of God in the Word and in the Sacraments; here Christ who is Prophet, Priest and King teaches. blesses and guides us through His gift of the Priesthood. From when we were baptised till the time of our death, the Church is there to help us on our journey into eternal life.

So we can have great confidence in God's own plan in establishing the Church and His promise to be with us always, even to the end of the world, and to guide us into all truth. The problems come not from the teachings, structure or sacraments of the Church but from the weakness of its members. Our concern should be for the members of the Church to be more faithful, but not to change the Church from what God wants us to be. We look to the Sacred Scriptures (i.e. the Bible), the Councils of the Church and the Saints to better understand what it means to be Catholic, and we are guided in this today by the Pope and Bishops who are appointed, ordained and guided by the Holy Spirit. Hopefully the Holy Spirit will give us a Bishop for Wagga soon! We pray in trust.

Catholic Church announces national drought prayer campaign

The Catholic Church in Australia is dedicating the month of November as a time to pray for those affected by crippling drought conditions and to pray for the gift of rain.

Parishes, schools, families and other Catholic communities across the country are being encouraged to participate in the National Prayer Campaign for Drought, which also invites people to provide assistance to those most in need.

The Bureau of Meteorology says that, on some measures, the current drought is the worst in 100 years or more, with most parts of Australia's eastern states declared to be in drought.

Bishop Columba Macbeth-Green OSPPE from Wilcannia-Forbes oversees a diocese that covers about half of New South Wales, including some of the most drought-affected areas in the country.

7 tips on how to discipline a child, from St John Bosco

Saint John Bosco's helpful advice for the weary parent or frustrated teacher - Philip Kosloski

One of the most challenging things about raising a child is knowing how, and when, to discipline. What is a parent (or teacher) to do when a kid knows the exact buttons to push for maximum challenge, and nothing seems to be working?

Meet Saint John Bosco. You may call him "Don," if you like.

Don Bosco knows precisely what you're going through, as he devoted his entire life to forming young rebellious boys. He took in hundreds of disadvantaged youth, educating them and exerting all of his energy towards turning these boys into upright men who would serve the greater good of society.

As his efforts grew, John Bosco needed the help of others. This meant forming new teachers, too.

In his letters to the teachers, John Bosco lays out a detailed "Preventive System" of education that seeks to dispose "the pupils to obey not from fear or compulsion, but from persuasion. In this system all force must be excluded, and in its place, charity must be the mainspring of action."

Here are seven tips that Saint John Bosco gave his teachers that are still relevant today and can help the weary parent or frustrated teacher guide children to the path of virtue.

1) Punishment should be your last resort.

In my long, career as an educator, how often this has been brought home to me! No doubt it is ten times easier to lose our patience than to control it, to threaten a boy than to persuade him. No doubt, too, it is much more gratifying- to our pride to punish those who resist us, than to bear them with firm kindness. St. Paul often lamented how some converts to the faith too easily returned to their inveterate habits; yet he bore it all with patience as zealous as it was admirable. This is the kind of patience we need in dealing, with the young.

2) The educator must strive to make himself loved by his pupils, if he wishes to obtain their respect.

When he succeeds in doing this, the omission of some token of kindness is a punishment which rekindles emulation, revives courage and never degrades.

Every educator must make himself loved, if he wishes to be feared. He will attain this great end if he makes it clear by his words, and still more by his actions, that all his care and solicitude are directed towards the spiritual and temporal welfare of his pupils.

3) Except in very rare instances, corrections and punishments should not be given in public, but privately and apart from the others.

We should, therefore, correct them with the patience of a father. Never, as far as possible, correct in public, but in private, or as they say — in camera caritatis –apart from the others. Only in cases of preventing or remedying- serious scandal would I permit public corrections or punishments.

4) To strike one in any way, to make him kneel in a painful position, to pull his ears, and other similar punishments, must be absolutely avoided.

The law forbids them, and they greatly irritate the boys and lower the reputation of the educator.

5) The educator must see that the laws of discipline, and the rewards and punishments entailed, are made known to the pupil, so that no one can make the excuse that he did not know what was commanded or forbidden.

[In other words, children need boundaries and respond well to them. No one feels secure if flying blind, and they'll always crash.]



6) Be exacting when it is a matter of duty, firm in the pursuit of good, courageous in preventing evil, but always gentle and prudent. I assure you, real success can only come from patience.

Impatience merely disgusts the pupils and spreads discontent among the best of them. Long experience has taught me that patience is the only remedy for even the worst cases of disobedience and irresponsiveness among boys. Sometimes, after making many patient efforts without obtaining success, I deemed it necessary to resort to severe measures. Yet these never achieved anything, and in the end, I always found that charity finally triumphed where severity had met with failure. Charity is the cure-all though it may be slow in effecting its cure.

7) To be real fathers in dealing with the young, we must not allow the shadow of anger to darken our countenance.

If at times we are taken unawares, let the bright serenity of our minds immediately disperse the clouds of impatience. Self-control must rule our whole being-our mind, our heart, our lips. When someone is at fault, arouse sympathy in your heart and entertain hope in your mind for him; then you will correct him with profit.

In certain difficult moments, a humble prayer to God is much more useful than a violent outburst of anger. Your pupils will certainly draw no profit from your impatience; you will not be edifying anyone who may observe you.

Iranian official admits mass conversions from Islam to Christianity are "happening right before our eyes"

Iran's Minister of Intelligence has warned a gathering of Shia Muslim leaders that mass conversions to Christianity are taking place right across the country.

According to Article 18, a nonprofit organisation that

advocates religious freedom in Iran, Mahmoud Alavi told the Shia clerics who had gathered in Qom that mass conversions are "happening right before our eyes."

Alavi went on to admit that he had summoned converts to Christianity for questioning, in violation of

Article 23 of Iran's constitution, which states that "no-one may be molested or taken to task simply for holding a certain belief."

"Some [of the converts] said they were looking for a religion that gives them peace," Alavi said. "These converts are ordinary people, whose jobs are selling sandwiches or similar things."

Article 18's Advocacy Director Mansour Borji said this is a "huge shift away from Iran's usual rhetoric that converts are agents of the West who have undergone significant training to

undermine national security."

Astonishingly, this comes as British Foreign Secretary Jeremy Hunt revealed Christian persecution is close to "genocidal levels", with Christians in some parts of the Middle East facing the possibility of extinction.

101 year old convert's First Holy Communion



Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. At 101 years old, Dona Penha has seen quite a bit of life. But the centenarian experienced something new a three years ago, as she received her First Communion during Mass at Our Lady of Mount Carmel nursing home in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

For those who witnessed the occasion, it was a great testimony to the love of God.

"It was a very beautiful moment that showed us that it is never too late to receive the Eucharist, which for someone seeking God, neither time nor shame can prevent," said the administrative assistant of the nursing home, Josiane Ribeiro. She added that occasions like this help "reaffirm faith."

Ribeiro told CNA that Dona Penha arrived about a year ago at the



nursing home, which is run by the Sisters of the Our Lady of the Rosary of Fatima Association. There is a chapel on site where Mass is celebrated during the week.

Dona Penha began to attend Mass with the other women. One day, she asked to go to Confession. Father Domingos Sávio Silva Ferreira realized she had not yet received Communion and asked the sisters to prepare her to receive the sacrament, Ribeiro recalled.

After that preparation, Dona Penha received Communion for the first time. According to nursing home officials, those who were with her could see that "that was what she really wanted." Even at 101 years of age, they said, "she is very lucid, and prepared to receive First Communion from the heart."
