PASTOR'S PAGE - BAPTISED "IN THE NAME OF THE FATHER AND OF THE SON AND OF THE HOLY SPIRIT"



7th Century

In every parish Church, one of the most significant furnishings is the Baptism Font. In many ancient churches across Europe the font is as old as the altar, and touching it today we can think of the thousands of people who have at that place entered into the life of Christ. There God's life was poured into their soul.

Most of these fonts, like the altars, are made of stone. This indicates that the seal of baptism is forever, and the grace baptism gives is the same grace which, if maintained or restored during this life, enables us to live forever in heaven. The Psalms tell us that God is "the Rock who saves us", and that we are to build our house on solid rock. We do that when we build on the Faith, Hope and Charity we receive in Baptism.

Our new baptism font will be blessed on September 8 (and maybe again when our diocese gets a new Bishop). This blessing is an occasion to thank God for our own baptism, and to recommit to live our share in the life of the Blessed Trinity.

One of the features of our font is the symbol of the Most Blessed Trinity in the form of the three leaf shamrock. It is told that St Patrick used a shamrock to explain the mystery of the Trinity to the leaders of Ireland. The other symbols carved into the sandstone of our

font when it was made at the Gosford Quarries include the Alfa and Omega (Jesus is the beginning and the end, the centre of our life); the Chi-Rho (first Greek letters in the name Christ); and of course the Cross, reminding us that it is through Our Blessed Lord's saving death that Baptism has the power to save us.

Baptism is the door to the Church; through this Sacrament we are first washed clean from Original Sin, and of personal sins of older converts. At the very same moment, new life is poured into our souls, a very share in the Life of God.

Supernatural Virtues of Faith, Hope and Divine Love are ours, a created share in the uncreated holiness of God. We become children of God the Father, through the Son, in the Holy Spirit.

Here are some quotes on Baptism by the Saints:

"The Lord was Baptized, not to be cleansed Himself, but to cleanse the waters, so that those waters, cleansed by the flesh of Christ which knew no sin, might have the power of Baptism." - St. Ambrose of Milan

"If, therefore, there is any grace in the water, it is not from the nature of water but from the Spirit's presence there." - St. Basil the Great

"Every baptized person should consider that it is in the womb of the Church where he is transformed from a child of Adam to a child of God." - St. Vincent Ferrer

"Just as a man cannot live in the flesh unless he is born in the flesh, even so a man cannot have the spiritual life of grace unless he is born again spiritually. This regeneration is effected by Baptism: 'Unless a man is born again of water and the Holv Spirit. he cannot enter into the kingdom of *God"* (*Jn* 3:5)'" - St. Thomas Aquinas

"Baptism is not the work of man but of Christ, and this sacrament is so holy that it would not be defiled. even if the minister were a murderer." - St. Isidore, Doctor of the Church

"Baptize first the children; and if they can speak for themselves, let them do so. Otherwise, let their parents or other relatives speak for them." - St. Hippolytus of Rome

Finally, to those who have been baptised, St Leo the Great said in a Christmas homily, "Christians, remember your dignity!"

Once imprisoned, Chinese woman now guides others to the Catholic faith Catherine Sheehan



A woman who spent 20 years imprisoned in China for being a faithful Catholic has helped hundreds of Chinese migrants convert to the faith in Australia.

Teresa Liu, now 86 and living in Sydney, was imprisoned in Guangzhou from 1957 to 1977 by the Chinese communist government.

She was never given a trial and spent some of her sentence in solitary confinement — at one point for a period of seven months.

Denied access to the sacraments and the Bible throughout her incarceration, Liu kept her faith alive by praying secretly in her cell.

"I could say the rosary only after I lie down in bed, secretly," she told Catholic News Service. "I felt very close to God at that time because in my heart I said, 'Jesus, now I have nothing but you. Don't let me leave you.""

Liu's crime was being a member of a Catholic lay organization, the Legion of Mary, which was considered an "anti-revolutionary" group by the Chinese leaders.

Her other crime was remaining faithful to the pope by refusing to join the state-run Chinese Patriotic Catholic Association.

Following her release, Liu immigrated to Australia in 1980 with her husband, John Bosco Liu, who had been in prison for 22 years.

Now a devout and active parishioner at St. Michael Parish in Hurstville, in southern Sydney, Liu has spent decades catechizing Chinese migrants. Providing them one-on-one faith formation in their own language — Cantonese or Mandarin — she has guided hundreds into entering the Catholic Church, said Father Janusz Bieniek, pastor and a member of the Congregation of St. Michael the Archangel.

"She is very supportive of all initiatives in the parish, especially the work of evangelization with people from China who are thinking of becoming Christian," Father Bieniek told CNS. "She gathers them, talks to them, personally keeps contact with them and encourages them."

Liu has sponsored numerous people who have been baptized into the faith and she is often asked to be godmother to their children.

Recently she was invested as a dame in the Equestrian Order of St. Gregory the Great in recognition of her "outstanding commitment to faith" demonstrated "through her Christian outreach to and conversion of many people in the Archdiocese of Sydney."

Investiture in the order is the highest honor the church bestows on laypeople and is given in recognition of extraordinary service to the church.

Father Bieniek described Liu, a daily Mass attendee, as a "person of prayer."

"She is a very credible witness to the faith and at the same time very quiet and unassuming. People know about her past, her experiences and sufferings, but she doesn't boast about this," he said.

"She is very positive and never has any kind of talk about revenge or hatred. She has no anger so that makes a very big impression on people."

Liu said she has forgiven her captors.

"Those people were just doing their duty, their job. They also are victims of the communist system," she said. She was only 25 when she was arrested. She was newly engaged to her future husband at the time.

Prior to their engagement, she had wanted to become a Carmelite nun but changed her mind when John Bosco Liu told her that he loved her.

Liu spent some of her sentence in the same prison as her husband, but the couple had only fleeting glimpses of each other during that time. Speaking or showing any signs of affection would have meant severe punishment for both.

As soon as she was free, she wrote to him expressing her love. They were married in 1979 after John Bosco Liu's release.

Their marriage lasted just 10 years, however. John Bosco Liu died of a heart attack immediately after receiving holy Communion during Mass. Liu was by his side at the time.

"I'm very grateful to God that he died peacefully and after receiving holy Communion," she said.

Liu also lost her eldest brother Paul to the communist regime. He died in prison after serving a 15-year sentence, leaving behind a wife and eight children.

Priests and nuns from Guangzhou also were imprisoned, including Archbishop Dominic Tang Yeeming, who spent 22 years behind bars without a trial.

Liu said all people have the right to freely practice their faith, which she called "the natural law."

She expressed gratitude that God had granted her a long life so she could tell her story as well as "the story of many, many people in China."

"Pray for China. The situation in China now in some ways is worse than it was for us. ... They want to destroy every religion," she said.

"Thank God I still have the chance to speak about my experience today. In the beginning, at first, I said, 'Thank God.' And my last word also is, 'Thank God very much.""

Farewell Tim Fischer



As the nation mourns the death of the Honourable Tim Fischer, we too as a parish express our prayerful condolences and sympathy to Vicky and Yves Baudry. Vicki was Tim's sister.

In her own way, Vicky has made a significant contribution to the parish over many decades by her family's presence and her generosity of time to the music ministry, playing the organ during the 9 am Sunday Masses. For several years more recently, Vicky and Yves have served as volunteers at the Kalumburu Mission in the Diocese of Broome. Kalumburu is the most northern settlement in Western Australia.

Tim Fischer served our country as a farmer from Boree Creek. As a military conscript, he was wounded in battle serving in Vietnam. He was a politician for both state and national governments, the leader of the National Party and a Deputy

Prime Minister. He was also a dedicated rail enthusiast and made his last run on Thursday from Junee Yards to Albury in a vintage train.

On Thursday, August 29 at the Albury Entertainment Centre, Tim was honoured with a State Service of Celebration and Farewell. During this celebration, which was attended by over 800 people, the Prime Minister the Honourable Scott Morrison spoke highly of Tim, as did other politicians, friends and family, all of whom paid fitting tribute to Tim as a man of deep faith who served his country and family with integrity. After serving the nation as a parliamentarian, he was invited to be the Australian Ambassador to the Holy See, Rome.

At the end of the civil ceremony, Fr Tony Percy led a most fitting prayer for Tim. He also informed those gathered for the occasion that Pope Francis paid tribute to Tim by honouring him with the Medal of the Order of St Gregory the Great (Pope St Gregory's feast day is Tuesday, September 3). May Tim's soul and all the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace.

Important message from pro-life politician

Thank you for your continued support in advocating for the Reproductive Health Care Reform Bill **to be rejected**. Thank you to those who lodged submissions to the Social Issues committee and signed the petition calling on the Legislative Council to reject the Abortion bill.

As a result of your support we were able to lodge the petition to the Parliament with close to 100,000 signatures, and over 13,000 submissions were made to the Social Issues committee. As a result of this advocacy the Bill has been delayed for three weeks.

It will now be debated and voted on in the Legislative Council from the 17-19 September.

Over the last week I have been calling on the Premier, Gladys Berejekilian, and the Deputy Premier, John Barilaro, to intervene by stopping this bill and reinstating the proper consultation process. To provide an idea of a proper community consultation in the NSW Parliament, the Animal Cruelty Laws were given 5 months for public consultation. The Reproductive Health Care Reform Bill has only been given 5 days.

I urge you to call on the Premier and Deputy Premier to express your opposition to this bill and call for a proper community consultation before this bill passes the Legislative Council.




